ing, as well as cutting out the windows, use only a sharp knife. Score the dotted lines on the front and the crossed lines on the back of your pulp tray cutouts. Bend each scored line away from the side scored.

After cutting out the various sections for each building, fold the basic building itself. Then glue together, using the tab. Finally, glue on roof.

Easy-to-Follow Steps

Here are some simple steps to follow for three of the houses.

Red house: Glue tiny porch roof over the front door.


Green house: Note the cutout section on the roof. Glue on roof so cutout section fits around chimney.

Yellow house: Be sure to glue on the back roof first, with cutout section in the front. Then glue on the front roof.

For the church, first glue the steeple together, using tab. Then glue steeple to roof.

Using tempera, paint the houses and church as colorfully and as decoratively as you like.


To give your Christmas village a really wintery look, glue cotton to houses for snow. Also use cotton to make snow-covered bushes and



shrubs. For sparkling snow, sprinkle cotton with glitter.

For each tree, cut two pieces, as shown, and slide one slit into the other. Make smaller trees, 2" high and $1\frac{1}{2}$ " wide, in the same way. Add cotton and glitter.

Cut out the tiny Santa and his sleigh from the actual-size pattern. Paint and glue to the roof of one of your houses.



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
